

Banwell Parish Council – Who We Are

Parish and Town Councils are the level of local government closest to the needs of local people. A Parish Council is the first tier of local government in England and as an elected body we are responsible and responsive to our electorate (that's you!).

Laws give the Parish Council a wide remit to improve the lives of their local community. The Council collects a precept each year (a sum collected with the council tax each year from the householders in the parish) to maintain and improve facilities and services for local people. Our work falls into three categories:

- Representing the community
- Delivering services to meet local needs
- Striving to improve quality of life in the Parish.

You can see from the table below what your Parish Council is responsible for – and also what North Somerset Council has to do. It's helpful to know who to go when you have a question or a problem. Banwell Parish Councillors & Staff

Banwell Parish Council is made up of 12 Councillors - all of whom are volunteers. The period of office of a Councillor is normally 4 years, but if they have been co-opted or elected at a by-election, they will serve until the next normal election.

Banwell Parish Council Chairman's Report 2024-25 (Paul Harding)

I think I can only start with after a hundred years, despite the nay sayers and purveyors of untruths, Banwell is finally getting its Bypass. Finance, planning and a contractor are all in place to deliver this essential piece of infrastructure and you can't fail to notice the works are progressing aplomb. Expect disruption until 2027, but in the end, a significant proportion of the traffic will be removed from the village. On the evidence from our Vehicle Activated Speed unit, we estimate more than 5,000,000 vehicles enter the village each year. We are aware that not everyone is in favour of the Bypass and BPC have been fully aware from the start of the current project that this meant the Garden Village originally proposed in the Joint Spatial Plan would become a reality. However, as the late Derek Mead once said to the Parish Council: "You can have the houses and a Bypass, or just the houses." BPC has liaised closely with NSC and the Bypass team who are here tonight. In case you were wondering - YES, there will be a party on the Bypass before it opens.

That leads me on to the Wolvershill Road development. We have had meetings with the main developers and NSC to influence the developers to benefit both current and future residents. We have held public meetings for residents to air their views. There are still areas of concern regarding the strategic green gap and placing of facilities, but we will continue to challenge where necessary. We have met with NSC to discuss the disastrous proposal to close the bridge over the M5 towards Worle for cars – now withdrawn, in no small part to the efforts of Steve Voller. We look forward to NSC putting the M5 Junction 21 relief road on the Master Plan for the Wolvershill Rd estate, and the completion of the North South link road through Locking Parklands and Mead Fields, or at the very least pedestrian access to the new Locking Parklands schools from Mead Fields.

Whilst I have started with the two biggest events affecting us, Banwell is far more than just the Bypass and Wolvershill Road development.

In the last year we have lost ClIrs Gibbons and McCarthy but gained ClIr Thain. I thank both ClIrs Gibbons and McCarthy for their service to the community. We have a vacancy if anyone is interested. We have recruited an Environment and Biodiversity Officer – Amy Symonds who will talk to you next. The Clerk and ClIrs Blatchford and Thian have attended stakeholder meetings on the Mead Fields development. We intend to hold PC meetings on Mead Fields in the future once a suitable venue is in place.

We work closely with our Ward Councillor Joe Tristram who is quick to take up matters when we raise them.

We have enhanced the Recreation Ground from CIL monies, and we now have the toddler area accessible 365 days a year, and an all-year accessible path constructed which means Banwell now has a safe place for children on bikes/scooters to safely exercise away from the traffic.

We continue to offer support to the residents through:



- Continued outpost of Weston Foodbank



Your Council Tax Precept 2025/26 Explained

The primary source of income for most Parish Councils comes from the Precept, part of the Council Tax.

WHAT IS A PRECEPT?

The Parish Council receives a small proportion of the local Council Tax. It does not receive any direct funding from Central Government. The funding collected pays for the running of the Council and the services it provides.

HOW IS IT CALCULATED?

The Parish Council makes an estimate of income and expenditure for the next financial year, including some for future planned projects and/or unexpected events. It is then calculated as an amount per Council Tax Band D Property and added to the Council Tax Bill for all the dwellings within the Parish area.

HOW IS IT RAISED?

North Somerset Council collects your Council Tax on behalf of themselves, Police, Fire and the precepts for any Parish/Town Councils in their district. It is important to note that Banwell Parish Council's precept is just a small percentage of your overall Council Tax Bill.

HOW IS IT SPENT?

Your precept is spent on maintaining the facilities and services the Parish Council offers.

Wolvershill Working Groups

These new working groups have been running for a year and have met a number of times. They were established for a dual purpose. The first is to feed into North Somerset's Local Plan which has allocated the land at Wolvershill as a strategic planning site. The second is to feed into the creation of an overarching Master Plan for the new Development which will include design codes, green spaces, retail space, light industrial, schools, etc...

The Liaison Group consists of the Chair, Vice-chair, Chair of Planning and the Clerk who are working directly with North Somerset and the three main developers. Banwell Sustainability Group

Your Parish Council has been buzzing with excitement for nature this year! Here's what we've been up to.

Communications: We've been sharing lots of nature and sustainability tips on our social media! Each month, we'll focus on different themes, from plastic reduction to wildlife gardening. We hope these posts inspire you to connect with nature and make a positive impact on the environment!

Nature focused workshop:

In February, we had a fantastic session with Banwell Youth Club, where young people got hands-on with nature-friendly crafts. Using locally sourced willow from Somerset, they skillfully wove bird feeders to help support our local bird population as we move into spring. The session was such a success that we expanded the workshop to the wider community — and over 30 people attended. Each participant had the opportunity to craft their own beautiful willow bird feeder, supporting birds during the crucial nesting season. It was a brilliant way to connect with nature, learn a new skill, and bring people together. More workshops are planned, so keep an eye out.



Banwell sustainability group

We're reinstating the Sustainability Working Group with a new focus on rejuvenating Banwell's green spaces for both nature and the community. Guided by the results of an ecological survey, we'll collaborate on ideas and present recommendations to the Parish Council. Our goal is to create long-lasting, sustainable improvements that benefit both the environment and local people. Biodiversity and Sustainability Action Plan:

We've already taken steps such as continuing the Terracycle scheme at the Youth & Community Centre for biscuit and snack wrappers, supporting the 'Wash & Squash' campaign, and collaborating with North Somerset Council to ensure a strategic green gap. Going Green: Solar Panels Battery Storage for our Community Buildings

Thanks to the support of the North Somerset Business Fund, the Parish Council has secured funding for solar panel battery storage which will service both the Youth & Community Centre and the Scout Building. Continuing the work to make our community buildings more sustainable and environmentally friendly.

Banwell Recreation Ground All Weather Path

Work on the brand-new all-weather path at the Recreation Ground is now complete — and we're delighted with the results! The path, along with the new all-weather surfaces under several pieces of toddler equipment, means the space is now even more accessible and enjoyable year-round, whatever the weather. We've already received lots of positive feedback from residents, and it's great to see the improvements being so well used and appreciated.

Saving Lives: Community Defibrillator Training

In March, we held two defibrillator training sessions at the Youth & Community Centre — part of our commitment to community health and resilience. Sudden cardiac arrest claims around 100,000 lives a year in the UK, but with timely use of a defibrillator, survival rates can dramatically improve. These sessions were designed to build knowledge and confidence in using an Automated External Defibrillator (AED), and we're thrilled by the positive response. A huge thank-you goes to Pam Harris (St. Johns Ambulance), our fantastic trainer, for delivering such informative and engaging sessions. We're now planning to hold further training in Mead Fields this September.



Celebrating Community Spirit: Volunteer of the Year 2025

We are delighted to announce that the 2025 Recognition of Service to the Community Award has been presented to Jade Longmoor. This annual award honours those who go above and beyond to make Banwell a better place — often quietly, consistently, and without seeking recognition. Jade's long-standing commitment as a bell ringer and now Tower Captain has helped preserve a treasured tradition at the heart of village life. More recently, when North Somerset Children's Services withdrew the toddler group in early 2024, Jade stepped forward to fill the gap. Thanks to her initiative, we now have a warm, welcoming toddler group once again — a lifeline for local families and a joyful space for little ones. Her dedication embodies the spirit of our community, and we are proud to celebrate her contribution.
